



The Cayuga County Healthy Neighborhoods Program is giving away free products to help improve the safety of homes in Auburn, Locke and Moravia. Healthy Neighborhoods Program staff will visit homes in our target areas to look for issues related to:

- Fire and residential injuries
- Asthma
- Lead exposure
- Indoor air quality
- Slips and falls hazards

If a home checkup finds any health and safety concerns, families may get free items to address possible risks. Free items include carbon monoxide detectors, smoke detectors, night lights, cleaning kits, grip pads for rugs, grip tape for baths, child safety products, pest-proof garbage cans, and allergen-free pillow cases. Residents who get supplies will be revisited in a few months.

Questions About the Healthy Neighborhoods Program

Who can sign up for home visits?

The program covers all residents of Moravia and Locke, and parts of Auburn. Call (315) 253-1560 to ask if your address is in our target area.

What is involved in a home consultation?

Staff will enter your home, and check for possible issues. We will also ask questions. Using your answers and what we see, we may give you items or information to address potential hazards.

Can I call you to get the items but skip the home visit?

No. We need to come into the home to perform a home checkup to make sure all concerns are addressed.

Who should have a home checkup done?

Anyone in our target areas may have a home checkup. People with a health issue may find this especially helpful, such as asthma or lead exposure.

I live in an apartment. Can I still ask for a visit?

Yes. We work with renters, homeowners and landlords. Some items we provide should stay with the apartment and other items you may take if you move.

What's the cost to the program?

The program is free. All the products and educational materials that may be given are free to you. The New York State Department of Health pays for this program.
